

DIVERSITY HOLIDAYS

November 2023

National Native American Heritage Month, which celebrates the history and contributions of Native Americans.

National Family Caregivers Month, proclaimed in 2012 by former President Barack Obama. It honors the more than forty million caregivers across the country who support aging parents, ill spouses, or other loved ones with disabilities who remain at home.



1 All Saints' Day, a Christian holiday commemorating all known and unknown Christian saints. In Eastern Orthodox Christianity, the day is observed on the first Sunday after Pentecost.

2 All Souls' Day, a Christian holiday commemorating all faithful Christians who are now dead. In the Mexican tradition, the holiday is celebrated as Día de los Muertos (October 31–November 2), which is a time of remembrance for dead ancestors and a celebration of the continuity of life.

11 Veterans Day, a US federal holiday honoring military veterans. The date is also celebrated as Armistice Day or Remembrance Day in other parts of the world and commemorates the ending of World War I in 1918.

12 Diwali, the Hindu, Jain, and Sikh five-day festival of lights that celebrates new beginnings and the triumph of good over evil and light over darkness.

13-19 Transgender Awareness Week, the week before Transgender Day of Remembrance on November 20, in which people and organizations participate to help raise the visibility of transgender people and address issues members of the community face.

19 International Men's Day, emphasizes the important issues affecting males, including male health issue, improving the relations between genders, highlighting the importance of male role models, and promoting gender equality. This holiday is celebrated in more than seventy countries.

20 Remembrance Day of Remembrance, established in 1998 to memorialize those who have been killed as a result of transphobia and raise awareness of the continued violence endured by the transgender community.

23 Thanksgiving Day in the United States. It began as a day of giving thanks for the blessing of the harvest and of the preceding year.

24 Native American Heritage Day, held annually on the Friday after Thanksgiving, encourages Americans of all backgrounds to observe and honor Native Americans through appropriate ceremonies and activities. The law establishing the day was signed by President George W. Bush in 2008.

26 Feast of Christ the King, a Catholic holiday established to thank God for the gift of time and a rededication to the Christian faith.

28–January 6 Nativity Fast, a period of abstinence and penance practiced by the Eastern Orthodox, Oriental Orthodox, and Eastern Catholic Churches in preparation for the Nativity of Jesus.

30 St. Andrew's Day, the feast day for St. Andrew within various Christian denominations.

COMMUNITY FORUM: THE ISRAELI-PALESTINIAN CONFLICT

Perspectives & Constructive Dialogue on Recent Events

WHAT & WHY: We will bring together members of the community in the Eastern Panhandle of West Virginia to improve understanding of the recent and unprecedented escalation of violence between Hamas and Israelis. The objectives are to learn how Israelis and Palestinians perceive these current events; to participate in a constructive dialogue; and to consider follow-up engagement. Panelists will discuss their perspectives on the context, underlying issues, causes, and possible effects (medium to long term) of the current Israeli-Hamas war; relate how the respective parties on the ground understand the situation; and consider constructive ways participants can engage on this issue.

Adina Friedman (Israeli) is a scholar-practitioner of peacebuilding and conflict resolution, with decades of experience working on peacebuilding endeavors in the United States and internationally. She leads immersion travel to the region, particularly to Israel, the Palestinian territories, and Morocco. Friedman teaches at the Carter School of Peace and Conflict Resolution at George Mason University, Virginia, and is also the founding director of ILLI Initiatives. She holds a PhD in conflict analysis and resolution, an MA in history of the Middle East and Africa, and an MS in peace and development.

Joyce Ibrahim (Palestinian) has worked with Students for Middle East Peace at Georgetown University and later with Seeds of Peace as a conflict resolution counselor. She cofounded the former NGO, Love Thy Neighbor, where she conducted nonviolence trainings with Palestinian youth, and has raised awareness about the Israeli-Palestinian conflict across various churches in the DC metro area. She was also a member of the board of trustees of Friends of Sabeel North America. Ibrahim holds a BS in foreign service and an MA in international relations and international economics.

Moien Odeh (Palestinian) is an international human rights lawyer, and a PhD candidate at the Carter School for Peace and Conflict Resolution at George Mason University. In Jerusalem, Odeh represented Palestinians in leading public interest cases in Israeli courts. He founded and managed the legal clinic in East Jerusalem neighborhoods behind the Wall. He was a fellow at the State Department's Leaders for Democracy program and the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. Odeh holds a BA in accounting and bachelor and doctor of laws degrees. He writes for and speaks on Middle Eastern and US media.

Amos Gil (Israeli) has over 30 years' experience in building, managing, and expanding highly visible and influential human rights and peace building organizations. He served as a regional director for J Street; as CEO of the Jerusalem International YMCA; as founding executive director of Ir-Amim ("City of Peoples," "City of Nations"); and as executive director of ACRI—the Association for Civil Rights in Israel (comparable to the American ACLU). Gil has also taught at Tel Aviv University, DePaul University, and the University of Chicago. He lives in Israel and the United States.
